These include financial institutions such as major banks, insurance companies, investment companies, and many government agencies. Students master the fundamentals of economics as well as finance and develop an understanding of the critical role corporate finance and financial institutions play in shaping the national and global economy. Students who major in Financial Economics are well prepared to enter graduate school in either Finance or Economics. Financial Economics students may enroll in the 4+1 MBA program during their senior year. This option enables students to graduate with two degrees in five years: a Bachelor of Science in Financial Economics degree and a Master of Business Administration.
